The award recognises the best and fairest player in the Division 1 senior competition throughout the home and away season. Below are some of the players who might be in the running for the award:

ALBION

Troy Kelm, Josh Bench and Jeremy Mills have all had impressive seasons for Albion.

Kelm, one of the league's premier ruckman, was named in the best on 12 occasions this season, while Mills has provided the Cats with some experience.

Bench's season speaks for itself. The young gun represented the WRFL in the Community Championships and also got the chance to play for Vic Metro.

ALTONA

Captain Jordan Robbins has gone from strength to strength this season, he was named in the best 12 times.

Teammate Mitch Turnbull has been an X-Factor for Altona in the second half of the season and has been a big reason why the Vikings have been so damaging in-front of goal.

Joel Magnabosco is not one to count out. He is a player who relishes the pressure and the big stage and could snare some votes.

DEER PARK

Deer Park is a very good team and deserve to be favourites.

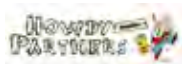
They ooze talent and class and are very well coached.

BULLEN SAYS FLAG WOULD BE ICING ON THE CAKE

IF Deer Park can defeat Hoppers Crossing on Sunday it would have done what no other senior team in the WRFL/FDFL history has done, win four premierships in a row.

The Lions have won the past three flags and are poised to add a fourth premiership cup to their growing trophy cabinet.

Deer Park's Reserves and Under-19 teams are also in the Grand Final, adding another special element to Sunday's decider.

Seniors coach Marc Bullen said the preparation for this Grand Final felt different to previous years as all three teams were playing off for premierships.

"(The club) is a great place to be at the moment," he said.

"The Seniors, Reserves and Under-19's have all made it through to the Grand Final.

"It is an excellent reward for the amount of time and effort both Pat Christofi and Andrew Bryson have put into their respective teams."

Bullen said Deer Park has gone through highs and lows like any other club would over the years, but says he is proud of everything the club has been able to achieve.

He said if the Senior side were the ones to hold up the premiership cup at the end of the day, it would be a pretty special feeling.

"Our club has had its fair share of ups and downs and this one is for all the people who have supported us through the good and bad times."

Their form on the field has been first class, since their Round 7 Bye, the club has won 11 straight matches.

"Overall our season has been very good, the competition as a whole has improved which is great," Bullen said.

"Our second half of the season has been outstanding.

"We have managed to play 41 players, which is an excellent effort, this included bleeding a couple our home grown players such as Mark Galea and James Harrison."

Bullen said there was stars across every line for Deer Park who all had the potential to be match winners.

"Kwame McHarg has owned the past three Grand Finals," he said.

"Jackson Barling returns to the big stage aiming for his third medal, Jack Purton-Smith returns to the side fresh from a week off, Scott Greenhough has taken his game to another level, Shannon Byrnes, Ryan Houlihan and Brendan Fevola are all big game players.

"If anyone can take the BOG medal off Kwame it will be Rodney Van Reit."

One of the club's biggest recruits has been former AFL champion Brendan Fevola. He is expected to line-up in the Grand Final after spending several weeks on the sidelines battling a sternum injury.

Bullen described the larger than life character as an exceptional player and person.

"He has embraced the club and they players love playing and training with him," he said.

"Fev's contribution and promotion of the club has been outstanding, a premiership medal and a bag of snags will cap of a fairly successful year for the King of the jungle winner."

Bullen wanted to thank the entire crew at Deer Park for their ongoing support and guidance throughout 2016.

"On behalf of the players I would like to thank everyone that has contributed to our success so far, coaches, trainers, footy managers, support staff, committee, sponsors and anyone else that wears the blue and gold," he said.

It was also used to inspire Australian diggers in the Second World War.

Congratulations to all those who officiated in the Grand Finals last weekend.

Their appointments were the result of lots of hard work through many training sessions, meetings and discussions with umpiring coaches and colleagues. Their names will be recorded and join the long list of umpires since 1931 who have been fortunate to umpire Grand Finals in our local league.

WRFL history is being created today with Christine Gent becoming the first female goal umpire to officiate in a Division 1 senior Grand Final. After breaking into the senior grade last season, Christine has continued to demonstrate the skills and abilities required to umpire consistently in Division 1.

Prior to this year Amy Galloway's Division 2 senior Grand Final in 2004 was the highest achievement by a WRFL female goalie.

In 2013 Bianca Michetti was the first female to run the boundary in a Division 1 senior Grand Final when Deer Park piped Spotswood by a solitary point.

Hopefully all those officiating today in the Division 1 Grand Finals will be able to confidently exhibit their skills on Whitten Oval and umpire to the best of their ability.

As mentioned in the previous two articles, so much about umpiring is about teamwork, composure, communication and control.

The history books and umpires' records will record the names of today's umpires but, more importantly, may those watching be able to see why these umpires (field, boundary and goal) have been chosen to represent the WRFL umpires on today's main stage.

UMPIRES SIGN OFF ON A SUCCESSFUL SEASON

IN season 2016 we have had the theme to “be the best you can be”.

The challenge was for all umpires to improve from where they were in 2015 by taking on board coaching advice, training hard, attending coaching sessions and working as a team.

We have more than 360 umpires involved in the WRFL covering field, boundary and goal over senior and junior football. The age range is from 13 through to 76 years of age which provides a great spread of experience as well as an opportunity to develop personally through linking with a wide range of people.

The focus of the WRFL umpiring department is to improve the skill of umpires, in all disciplines with a particularly focus on our younger umpires.

The umpire's academy commenced in 2009 at MacKillop College in Werribee and this weekend we will see the Division One Grand Final field umpires all come from that academy.

Shamus Dundon, Ryan Webster and Michael Westgarth, with an average age of 20 years, all commenced their umpiring career in 2009, with Ryan and Michael commencing as boundary umpires whilst Adam Cosham, ex-TAC player, sits the bench.

Over the years the WRFL have established more academies across the region and this has provided the opportunity for young people to get involved in umpiring with most also playing football in the WRFL.

Boundary and goal umpire development has had very similar success with a large growth in the number of females joining the ranks which has also been highlighted in this week's Division One Grand Final with Christine Gent appointed with Trevor Budge as the two debutant goal umpires.

Kia Abela, Robert Hill, Riley Kane and Jordan Wiltshire complete the Division One team with the boundary umpires average age being 18 years.

The future looks very good, from an umpiring perspective, with 30 field umpires having Division 1 experience and excellent growth in our junior ranks.

Good luck to all teams in today's Division 1 Grand Finals and hopefully the umpires will not even be noticed.

LAKERS CELEBRATE FIRST SENIOR PREMIERSHIP

THE Caroline Springs Lakers have won their first ever WRFL premiership after taking down the Yarraville Seddon Eagles by 14-points in the Division 2 Grand Final on Sunday.

The Lakers rode a best-on-ground performance from Lewis Tudor and a hot start from forward Mathew Sutton, who kicked three goals in the opening term, to outclass the Eagles and eventually claim the title.

After being humbled by the North Footscray Red Devils back in Round 17 to the tune of 61-points, the Lakers saved their best footy of the season for when it mattered most, winning their last five games of the year, dating back to Round 18.

On top of that, their last five games included wins all against top-4 opponents, besting Yarraville Seddon and Glen Orden twice each, and rival North Footscray by an average margin of 70-points. Suffice to say they peaked at the right time.

Meanwhile, Yarraville Seddon will be kicking themselves after their poor start to the game in which they conceded the first five goals of the contest and were forced to play catch-up the rest of the way.

Despite earning themselves a week off after their six-point win over favourite North Footscray in the first Semi-Final, the Eagles looked sluggish to start off things and were overwhelmed by Caroline Springs in the early minutes, especially in the centre as the Lakers midfield dominated the clearances and dictated the tempo.

Led by Tudor and Rodney Rich, the Lakers had their way with the Eagles through most of the first term and created havoc when they went forward, with Sutton and Brian Lake causing all kinds of problems for the Eagles backline.

Yarraville Seddon were almost held goalless for the entire first quarter until Scott Krakouer earned himself a free kick and booted their first major of the contest to stop the bleeding and cut the margin to 23-points as the first quarter came to a close.

The Eagles would hit back in the second quarter, kicking four goals while limiting the Lakers to just one for the term.

Kicking with the wind, it was almost the complete opposite from the opening quarter as the Eagles asserted themselves and began winning the hard ball gets. They had four different goal kickers in the term and after Krakouer booted his second goal in the 27th minute, Yarraville Seddon took their first lead of the game.

However, like Krakouer late in the first, Jason Degabriele snapped a late goal to stop the Eagles run and put the Lakers back up by 3-points heading into half-time.

After Yarraville Seddon kicked an early goal to start the third quarter, they took the lead back and looked primed to run away it, having kicked five of the last six goals.

However, Caroline Springs' backline held strong and they responded with the next three goals of the quarter, capped off by Sutton's fourth goal.

They led by 14-points as the fourth quarter began and extended their lead to 26 half way through the term after consecutive goals from Brian Lake and James Ryan. Just as it looked like they were about to bow the game open, the Eagles fought back once again.

When Chris Topalidis found Kevin Upton in the 26th minute for his second straight goal, the Eagles had rattled off three straight goals of their own and cut the lead down to nine with only minutes remaining.

However, it wasn't meant to be. Sutton's mark and goal only a minute later put the Eagles away for good and sent the Lakers' supporters into a frenzy.

With the win, Caroline Springs have been promoted and will move up to Division 1 next season.

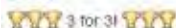

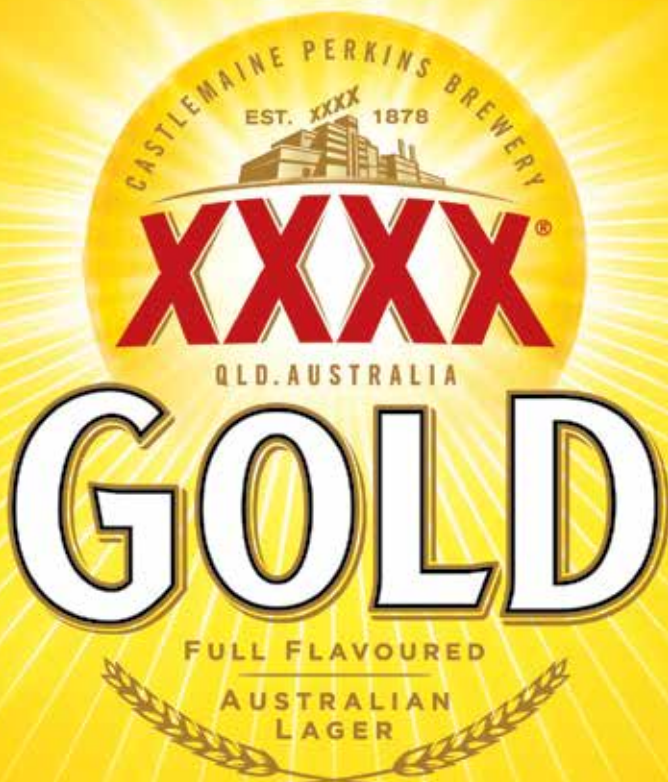
